YOUTH STORY: DRUG INTERVENTION PROGRAM

While in the midst of dealing with the grief of his mother's passing and the loss of his father's presences in his life, Darcy turned to drugs to numb the pain. By age 15, Darcy's drug use was having a detrimental effect in all areas of his life. Darcy became verbally aggressive towards his grandmother (whom he lived with), was in an abusive relationship, started missing a lot of school and got into legal trouble.

Darcy was referred to the Drug Intervention Program by his Probation Officer. After 78 weeks in the program, Darcy learned how to handle life without drugs. He is now associating with positive and law-abiding peers, joined a basketball league, obtained employment, began repairing family relationships, left the abusive relationship and learned to talk about and cope with issues in his life.

Darcy's self esteem grows everyday and he is excited about moving forward into a new life.
